

Materials Used:

Worsted weight yarn, in your choice of colors (Palette colors are merely suggestions)

Size I/9 (5.50mm) crochet hook

Yarn needle

Size/Gauge:

Gauge is not important to this project. The graph in this pattern is 20 squares w x 20 squares h.

Stitches Used/Abbreviations:

Ch-chain

Sc-single crochet

Hdc-half double crochet

Dc-double crochet

Instructions:

Graphs included for visual assistance. All stitches are Sc, and graphs are worked from the bottom, up. Rows are worked in a back and forth fashion, meaning you work one row in one direction, turn your work, and read the next row from the opposite direction. Each square in the graph represents one stitch. When you reach a new color on the graph, for that row, you drop the color you have, and pick up the new color, and continue to sc. You could either carry your yarn through your work (only suggested for short areas) or use bobbins for each color change. When you are finished, weave in all ends.

Color Changes: (This picture is used for demonstration purposes, and is not representative of colors used in design.)



This graph measures 20 squares wide x 20 squares high. Begin with a ch of 21. Sc in 2nd ch from hook, and each remaining ch. Ch, TURN. Follow graph for color changes.

Finishing: Do not fasten off at end of row 20, unless changing color. Ch 1, and, with right side facing, sc evenly around entire outer edge, placing 3 sc in each corner. Join to 1st sc. Fasten off.

To create a scarf:

Make your graph, following the basic instructions, continuing on after the last row of the graph, with sc rows, until you reach desired length of scarf. Now, flip your graph pattern upside down, and work it again, for the opposite end. Finish off, by sc around the entire outer edge.

To create pillows: Create a solid square, the same size as your graphed square, or create 2 graphed squares. Place one square on top of the other, with wrong sides together, and sc evenly around entire outer edge, through both layers and working 3 sc in each corner. Stuff as you go. Join. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

OR~Afghan Border:

Rnd 1: Join yarn in any corner. Ch 1, sc in each st around entire outer edge, working 3 sc in each corner. Join.

Rnd 2: ch 1. Hdc in each st around, working 3 hdc in each corner. Join.

Rnd 3: OPTION 1~Smooth Edge:

Ch 2. Dc in each st around, working 3 dc in each corner. Join. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

OR OPTION 2~Ruffled Edge:

Ch 2. Work 2 dc in each st around, working 4 dc in each corner. Join. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Did you know?? Graphs can also be used for cross stitched or embroidery work! Simply create a single crocheted base, and follow the graph to place your cross stitches on top! ☺
